Summer is the perfect time to catch up on your reading. Here are some new items available at the Dulaney-Browne Library for you to consideration.

Breeding Contempt: the history of coerced sterilization in the United States by Mark A. Largent

People were coerced into sterilization? Who knew? This book discusses the history of sterilization in the United States. More specifically it details doctors who were advocating sterilization in the mid-nineteenth century and early twentieth century. They wanted to sterilize people that were viewed as

degenerates such as criminals and mental health patients. The book goes on to discuss public figures that still hold these same sentiments/ prejudices today. One example is the forced birth control of welfare mothers.

Superpower on Crusade: the Bush doctrine in US foreign policy by Mel Gurtov

From the very beginning Bush has been criticized for his take on foreign policy. This book explores US foreign policy, taking a more specific view that it calls "the Bush Doctrine."

The Wars on Communism and Terror are explored as well as the Iraq War and North Korea. While at first glance the book seems to be very anti-Bush it claims the purpose of inspiring the purpose of inspiring debate. You be the judge. CAUTION: This book expresses opinions that could raise you blood pressure.

Unequal Under Law: race in the war on drugs by Doris Marie Provine

This book details the major movements in the war on drugs and how the basis of each movement has its roots in racism. The author believes that U.S. drug policy has its basis in racism. The author draws a parallel between drug policy/laws and minorities who are targeted. Accord-

ing to the book jacket "...campaigns to criminalize drug use have always conjured images of feared minorities. Explaining how alarm over a threatening black drug trade fueled support in the 1980's for a mandatory minimum sentencing scheme of unprecedented severity."
