Statutes

National Environmental Policy Act, Pub. L. No. 91-190, 83 Stat. 852, 42 U.S.C. §§ 4431 *et seq.*, is the primary Federal environmental law. It requires the government to safeguard the environment and to disclose the environmental effects of government action. The act simultaneously involves federal courts in environmental questions, expands judicial review into agency decisions, and gives Congress additional power over the environment. A significant administrative regulation related to the Act is Reorganization Plan No. 3, 35 Fed. Reg. 15, 263 (1970), which established the EPA and a number of other agencies concerned with protecting the environment. Specifically the EPA is responsible for regulating the air, water, noise, pesticides, and hazardous waste. Air Pollution – The Clean Air Act was originally passed in 1955, Pub. L. No. 84-159, and eventually was replaced by the Air Quality Act of 1967, Pub. L. No. 90-148, and subsequently amended by Pub. L. No. 91-604, 95-95, 98-213, 101-549, 42 U.S.C. §§ 7401-7642. Eleven separate Acts of Congress are found within what is referred to as the Clean Air Act today. Under the Act states prepare and submit plans to implement national clean air standards. The EPA approves plans and the states remain responsible for implementing them. Check the history section of the annotated statute for a complete list of amendments.

Water Pollution – Regulation of water pollution began with three pieces of legislation. The Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972, Pub. L. No. 92-500, 86 Stat. 816, 33 U.S.C. §§ 1251-1376, was the first comprehensive water pollution statute.

These amendments were supplemented by the Clean Water Act, Pub. L. No. 92-500, 33 U.S.C. §§ 1251-1387, in 1977 and the Water Quality Act of 1987, Pub. L. No. 100-4, 101 Stat. 7, 33 U.S.C. §§ 1251-1376. Check the history section of the annotated statute for a complete list of amendments. Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide – The Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act, 61 Stat. 163, 7 U.S.C. §§ 136-136y, is the primary legislation in this area. It requires the registration of chemical pesticide before the pesticide may be marketed in interstate commerce. It has been amended multiple times. Check the history section of the annotated statute for a complete list.

Toxic Substances – The Toxic Substances Control Act, Pub. L. No. 94-469, 90 Stat. 2003, 15 U.S.C. § 2601 *et seq.*, uses a screening strategy to protect from the harmful effects of chemical exposures. Check the history section of the annotated statute for a complete list of amendments.

Hazardous Waste – The Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) a/k/a the Solid Waste Disposal Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 6901-6992, has evolved from legislation that created grants to study waste into a multifaceted regime for managing and regulating hazardous waste. Check the history section of the annotated statute for a complete list of amendments.

Hazardous Substances (Superfund) – Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA) a/k/a/ Superfund Law, Pub. L. No. 96-510, 94 Stat. 2767, 42 U.S.C. § 9601 *et seq.*, was born out of the efforts and public outcry over ticking time bomb hazardous waste sites, like the infamous Love Canal in New York.

The act created an information gathering system, provided for specific federal authority to respond to emergencies and clean up sites, created a fund to pay for cleanup, and imposed strict liability to those who released hazardous substances at sites. Wildlife – The Endangered Species Act, 16 U.S.C. §§ 145 – 1464, requires the government to designate which species are endangered and to define their habitat, ensures interagency cooperation to protect endangered species, and prohibits taking endangered species. Administrative Law and Agencies

The EPA is the administrative agency that carries out federal environmental programs. In carrying out these programs the EPA is required to follow the Administrative Procedures Act. Therefore, the researcher will find the following in the *Federal Register* and *Code of Federal Regulations*: notices of proposed rule making and hearings; final and proposed rules; regulations; guidelines and policy statements. Regulations are frequently codified in title 40 of the *Code of Federal Regulations*. The following is a summary of subjects and their classification in parts within title 40 (adapted from Marke and Sloane).

If the agency or subject area involved is known the researcher may consult the daily table of contents appearing in the front of each issue of the *Federal Register*. For a more comprehensive search consult the *CIS Federal Register Index* or searching using GPO Access, <http://www.access.gpo.gov/>, or Hein Online.

The EPA website, <http://www.epa.gov/>, provides a wealth of information. Use the navigation bar on the left of the screen to access information by type of document. “EPA Newsroom” allows you to view press releases from 1994 – present and other news sources; “Browse EPA Topics” gives you information and background resources topically; “Laws and Regulations” provides access to major environmental statutes, final and proposed rules and regulations, non-binding general policy, guidance, and interpretive documents from 1999 – present and to the EPA docket system which tracks agency actions released in the federal register; finally, “Information Sources” provides access to a repository of all EPA documents.

The EPA is not the only administrative agency whose work touches the environment. Others include: Department of Defense Environmental Resources, Department of Energy

Environmental Management, Department of the Navy Environmental Program, Department of the Interior, U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, U.S. Forest Service, Natural Resources Conservation Service and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association.

Loose Leafs

Grad, Frank P., *Treatise on Environmental Law* (New York: Matthew Bender, 1971 -) OCU Call # KF 3775.A7. This major environmental treatise is authored by Frank P. Grad, the Chamberlain Professor of Legislation, Columbia Law School and Director of the Legislative Drafting Research Fund at Columbia University. In the preface the author states that he is not trying to compete with the environmental law loose leaf services but

to provide an integrated view of the field as a whole. The author addresses all major environmental laws, regulations, and court decisions and provides thoughtful discussion and analysis of such significant environmental problems as growth, depletion of natural resources, pollution-related health issues, power shortages and aesthetic considerations. The text is updated through both interfiled pages and yellow, front-end supplementary pages. This is a particularly valuable general resource for the environmental attorney, government policy specialist, or corporate counsel specializing in environmental issues. Features include a bibliography of books and reports, table of cases, index, explanation of EPA terms, and two Primary Source Material volumes containing the text of major environmental law statutes. Cost is \$1,140 to acquire and \$900 each year to update. (Description from Svengalis pp. 266).

BNA's *Environmental Reporter* (library stopped subscribing in 2000) OCU Call # KF 3775.A6. This is a combination current awareness and reference service which provides coverage of legislative, administrative, and judicial developments in the areas of pollution control and environmental protection. Its 13 volumes include those devoted to current developments, court decisions, federal laws, federal regulations, and mining laws. Court decisions in loose leaf form are eventually replaced by permanent bound volumes. An important tool for the attorney charged with tracking developments in environmental law. Finding aids found in the Decisions binder include: an index digest, a topical index, a table of cases by jurisdiction and a classification guide. Finding aids for the set in general include: a table of contents for each set of binders, a master index to all federal laws and regulations, a guide to federal regulations, and a state laws index. The cost for this loose leaf is about \$3,300 per year and the CD-ROM version tops \$8,000 per year. (Description from Svengalis pp. 265).

State Resources

It is important to recognize federalism issues when researching an environmental law issue. These issues can creep up in several ways. First, environmental problems simply occur. They do not pay attention to geographic or political boundaries and can impact several states and resources regulated by state and federal law. Secondly, many federal programs require state implementation and conversely state programs may impinge upon an area already regulated by a federal statute or agency.

Oklahoma Resources - Statutes

The first comprehensive environmental statute in Oklahoma was the Pollution Control Coordinating Act of 1968, 82 O.S. § 931 *et seq.* which was followed by the Oklahoma Environmental Quality Act, 27A O.S. § 1-1-101 *et seq.* The purpose of the Environmental Quality Act was to address the environmental regulatory concerns of industry and the public, to improve the manner in which citizen complaints are tracked and resolved, to better utilize state financial resources for environmental regulatory services; and to coordinate environmental activities of state environmental agencies.
